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# FBA RATES ANNOUNCED

On December 31, the USDA announced the per-acre payment rates for the Farmer Bridge Assistance Program. An estimated \$12 billion will be distributed to farmers, with \$11 billion allocated for row crops and \$1 billion designated for specialty crops and sugar. The farmer's payment is based on 2025 planted acres reported to the FSA office. Prevent plant acres are ineligible. Timelines for payments have yet to be established. Relevant rates are listed below:

- Corn: \$44.36
- Oats: \$81.75
- Sorghum: \$48.11
- Soybeans: \$30.88
- Sunflower: \$17.32
- Wheat: \$39.35

- Standard Deduction Increases
  - Single: \$16,100 (+\$350)
  - Married: \$32,200 (+\$700)
- IRA contribution limit: \$7,500 (+\$500)

- Mileage rate: 72.5 ¢/mile (+2.5 ¢)

## NORTH DAKOTA CARBON CAPTURE

A North Dakota district court judge ruled a state law unconstitutional. The law stated that once a carbon capture project was complete, the ownership of the storage facility and the CO<sub>2</sub> within would automatically transfer to the State (government) without payment. The Court concluded this would be an unjust taking by the government because a private landowner's "pore space" property could be seized without any compensation.

## UK TO BAN FARROWING CRATES

In its recent Animal Welfare Strategy announcement, the United Kingdom's Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) announced its plans to phase out hog farrowing crates and CO<sub>2</sub> used for stunning hogs. Crates are used to prevent sows from rolling over and accidentally crushing their piglets. The National Pig Association (NPA), which is the British equivalent of the National Pork Producers Council, is urging DEFRA to revise the strategy. NPA estimates that 5,000 flexible farrowing places are in operation, and another 1,000 are on the way. Flexible farrowing systems do not completely eliminate crates. As for banning CO<sub>2</sub> stunning, which is used to euthanize hogs at the processing plant, the NPA says there are "no viable alternatives." The U.K. plans to implement the strategy by 2030.

# REGENERATIVE PILOT PROGRAM

In December, the USDA and the U.S. Health and Human Services announced the \$700 million Regenerative Pilot Program. This program aims to assist farmers in improving soil health, enhancing water quality, and boosting long-term productivity. The funding will be divided between the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), both of which are established environmental stewardship programs that have received bipartisan support. About \$400 million will be allocated to EQIP, which provides cost-sharing for a single, new conservation practice. About \$300 million will be directed to CSP, which provides financial support for improving existing conservation efforts across the entire operation through annual payments. With the program announcement, it seems that the application process will be more streamlined for participants. The USDA has set January 15, 2026, as the batching deadline for EQIP, CSP, and ACEP.

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## SDALT

You have likely heard of the term “conservation easement” from the show Yellowstone, but what is it? An easement is a voluntary, legally binding agreement in which a landowner grants a right to use or not use property. For a conservation easement, the use is the right to convert the property. In South Dakota, we have the South Dakota Ag Land Trust (SDALT). This farmer-led organization holds conservation easements on land kept as working agricultural land. The price of the easement depends on the likelihood of development. 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## HAWAII CLIMATE TAX

Traveling to Hawaii soon? You will likely see a new “Green Fee” added to your bill. The new tax adds 75 cents to the daily hotel room and vacation rental rate. Additionally, cruise ship bills will see an 11% tax increase. Currently, Cruise Lines International is challenging the tax in a lawsuit. The purpose of the tax is to address the impacts of climate change by using the money for erosion mitigation and restoration projects. It is expected to generate \$100 million per year.



# NONPROFIT VS. TAX-EXEMPT

The terms nonprofit and tax-exempt create a lot of confusion. So, let's figure it out. 😊

“**Tax-exempt**” means transactions or income at the local, state, or federal level are free from federal income tax. “**Nonprofit**” refers to a type of organization whose primary purpose is not making a profit. Tax-exempt is regulated by the federal government under the Internal Revenue Code. Nonprofit status is governed by state law. Now, we need to figure out where the line between nonprofit and tax-exempt intersects. Typically, you will see entities operate as both **nonprofit** and **tax-exempt**, like a Colony. However, not all nonprofits are tax-exempt- so *never* assume you are tax-exempt. Plus, there are more than 26 types of tax-exempt organizations. South Dakota law defines a nonprofit corporation as a corporation where no part of its income or profit is distributed to its members, directors, or officers. Therefore, the profit made must be put towards the purpose for which the organization was created; everything is reinvested into the organization. The qualifications to be a tax-exempt organization are different than nonprofit qualifications, and are often stricter. One does not automatically become a tax-exempt organization. *You must elect or apply to become tax-exempt.* The IRS recommends you apply for tax-exempt status *within 18 months* of forming your corporation. Most nonprofit organizations qualify to be tax-exempt under the Internal Revenue Code subdivision of 501(c), with the most common type being 501(c)(3). A 501(c)(3) is a tax-exempt organization typically formed for a charitable, religious, or educational purpose. Examples of 501(c)(3) organizations include churches, food banks, and the Salvation Army. People who donate money or goods to these organizations can deduct their donation from their taxable income on their tax return.

The most common type of tax-exempt organization that we work with is the 501(d). To be a 501(d) tax-exempt organization one must:

1. Be an apostolic or religious corporation or association,
2. Maintain a community or common treasury,
3. Engage in business for the benefit of its members,
4. Incorporate the members' pro rata share of the organization's taxable income for the year into the gross income as dividends received, regardless of distribution

However, being a tax-exempt organization **does not** mean that the entity is exempt from all taxes. These entities are still required to pay property taxes, sales and use taxes, payroll tax, unemployment tax, etc., unless a special exemption exists at the state level. To maintain a tax-exempt status, your nonprofit tax-exempt corporation must comply with its unique guidelines. In 2025, Leut Services filed six tax-exempt applications. If your corporation does not have tax-exempt status and qualifies for it, we will gladly assist with filing the application.

## RECIPE OF THE MONTH BRAN MUFFINS

*A healthier option to start the New Year.*

2 cups flour  
2 cups bran  
14 tablespoons sugar  
1 ¼ teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
¼ cup molasses  
1 cup cold water  
1 tablespoon instant coffee granules  
1 cup cold milk  
1 cup vegetable oil  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 350°F. Mix flour, bran, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Make a hole in the center of the mixture and add molasses, water, instant coffee granules, milk, vegetable oil, eggs, vanilla, and raisins. Let the batter sit for 4-5 hours before baking.
